Objectives

- Explain how the dignity and respect for the human person must guide the ethics of genetic screening and genetic engineering.
- Identify the current scientific and technological practices that purport to assist the human person via human genetic interventions.
- Appraise varying practices relating to human genetic interventions in light of ethical concerns for the dignity of the person.
- Discuss the history of the Hippocratic Oath and its practical implications for medicine that is dignified, compassionate, and loving.
- Compare and contrast medicine rooted in a modern secular philosophy with medicine rooted in the Hippocratic Oath.
- Consider which medical practices are a variance with Hippocratic medicine and care for the dignity of the human person.
- Discuss the causes and factors that have led to the development of the mental health crisis for children and teenagers in the United States.
- Appraise the effect of technology in relation to the mental health crisis.
- Assess varying strategies for health care professionals in collaboration with families and schools to address the causes of stressors that have increased the struggles with suicide ideation, hopelessness, anxiety, and depression.
- Describe interventions utilized in fertility awareness-based methods (FABMs) and in restorative reproductive women's health care, which assist in the flourishing of the human person.
- Explain how FABMs can be effective in helping couples achieve pregnancy.
- Identify medically successful alternatives to artificial reproductive technologies.
- Discuss ethical issues regarding artificial reproductive technologies.
- Define virtue and explain its significance within the vocation of medicine.
- Differentiate between moral and formal cooperation.
- Evaluate how the principle of moral cooperation and the primacy of virtue can be applied to challenging ethical situations within health care.
- Identify the developments and uses of AI within medicine.
- Explore potential ethical and unethical uses of AI in medicine.
- Evaluate some of the current integration of AI within medicine and how the use of AI may impact the perception and appreciation of the dignity of the human person.
